As we reflect on the period from July to September 2023, we are filled with gratitude for the progress made both in Malawi and Uganda.

Despite the challenges and adversities facing Malawi, WHC

Malawi is dedicated to fostering sustainable development, with a focus on water, sanitation, and education. We've successfully drilled the OB 2 Village Well in Mambongo Village, benefiting over 900 residents clean water. Our with Hope proudly Scholarship program supports Nester Changala at the University of Livingstonia. Moreover, our ongoing proposal efforts for rural education enhancement and the recent interactions with Save the Children hint at promising future partnerships.

In Uganda, WHC has also seen significant advancements. HIGHLIGHTS FROM Q3 (JULY TO SEPTEMBER 2023)

WORLDHOPE CORPS MALAWI AND UGANDA

1. OB 2 Village Well, Mambongo Village, Malawi

In a major community initiative during the third quarter of this year, WHC Malawi conducted a hydrological survey and drilled the OB 2 Village Well in Mambongo Village. The borehole, drilled on August 21st and commissioned on August 28th, is now serving over 900 residents, offering a sustainable solution to the severe water scarcity the community has long endured. The borehole is 46 meters deep and was specifically positioned to provide water even during the dry season, which spans from August to December.

The successful commissioning event featured jubilant villagers, including women who prepared songs and dances to express their gratitude. The community chief gave a heartfelt testimony, emphasizing the transformative impact of the borehole in combating water-borne diseases



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like cholera, which have plagued the community for years.

The village chief also underscored the sociocultural benefits of the borehole. For years, women have had to walk long distances to fetch water, sometimes resulting in family strife and misunderstandings that often lead to marital discord. The chief noted that the borehole not only provides clean water but also contributes to family and social harmony within the community.

The chief made a solemn plea for further assistance. He called for the drilling of two additional boreholes in neighboring communities, which are similarly afflicted by water scarcity and health issues related to unsafe.

water. The project has thus highlighted the need for sustained investment in water infrastructure in the region.

Deep gratitude is expressed to the American sponsored of the OB 2 Village Well: The Men's Bible Study group who meet in Ocean Beach, San Diego, and the Water's Edge Faith Community who worship in OB.

2. Progress in the Women's Microlending Initiative: Phase Three Successfully Launched

Our women's micro-lending group has successfully advanced to its third phase. On September 19, 2023, a total of 7,700,000 UGX (\$2,040) was disbursed to the women in the group, enabling them to scale their various income-generating projects. This substantial disbursement was made possible through an additional donation of \$1,500, which was added to the previously collected sum of 4,500,000 UGX (\$1,190).

Due to this enhanced funding, each woman in the group received a larger loan compared to previous disbursements, the amount of which was determined based on individual eligibility criteria. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our USA donors for their third generous donation to this transformative project.

We are confident that your ongoing support will have a transformative impact. Your contributions do more than meet financial needs; they change lives by providing essential necessities for struggling families. Thank you for making a meaningful difference.

3. Skill Empowerment Program for Girls: Hope Tailoring School

Our Hope Tailoring School, which launched at the end of July, has already registered 15 beneficiaries. These students are currently undergoing foundational training in the art of tailoring. This initiative has proven to be especially transformative for teenage girls who had previously dropped out of school



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and believed their opportunities were limited. The skills they are acquiring promise not only to change their lives but also to provide them with the means for financial independence and self-sustainability. In turn, they will be empowered to support themselves and their families.

The students express immense gratitude for this newfound opportunity and are optimistic about their futures. They are currently under the guidance of a dedicated trainer, who has been with them since the program's inception in July.

The training sessions are held from Monday to Friday, thereby allowing for an expansive coverage of topics within a condensed timeframe.

4. Women's Empowerment Meetings: Progress in Soap-Making Initiative

women's The empowerment meetings have been highly effective in progressing our action plans. Most of the initiatives discussed have been successfully implemented, although some faced challenges that rescheduling. necessitated One focus of a recent meeting has been the organization of a soap-making project, aimed at diversifying and increasing household income.

5. Source of the Nile Shalom Coffee Cooperative: Elevating Standards through Training and Support

Members of our Shalom Coffee Cooperative have contributed a membership fee of UGX 10,000 (\$2.7) each, gaining access to valuable benefits such as advisory training sessions on coffee planting, care, and marketing. The cooperative convenes regularly to discuss critical topics like coffee quality and market price fluctuations. On two occasions, an agricultural officer has inspected members' coffee gardens to ensure optimal

growth vields. Shalom and community members reported that this initiative, facilitated through our **ABCD** strategy, is positively impacting our members bγ enhancing their financial well-being and living standards.

We awarded limited Hope Scholarships this quarter to three college students so that could continue their higher education: Nakamanya Shakirah, Baamu Purity, and Wolisigira Solomon. This critical support enabled them to proceed with their second semester without interruption. We appreciate your support during this challenging period and are grateful for your ongoing commitment to brightening the educational futures of these smart and deserving students.

7. Board and Staff Meeting Updates: Driving Efficiency and Strategic Decision-Making

Regular staff meetings have been instrumental in streamlining WHC Uganda's activities. These meetings focus on identifying challenges and crafting solutions, thereby enhancing our operational efficiency. Similarly, the WHC Uganda Board has convened multiple times to make

pivotal decisions that contribute to the betterment of the organization.

8. Monitoring and Assessment: Ensuring Responsible Loan Disbursement

Prior to the initiation of the third loan disbursement phase, we conducted riaorous monitorina assessments of our women beneficiaries. This allowed us to determine their eligibility for loans and assess how much they would responsibly be able to borrow and Through repay. diliaent monitoring and household impact assessment, we continually refine our services based on valuable feedback.
